Historic Newsletter Tidbits

ANNUALS

Shrubs, trees and perennials are all essential parts of any landscape. However, their peak time of beauty tends to be very seasonal and limited. For a continuous supply of colour and blossom through the hot summer months one should grow annuals. These are plants that live just one season in the garden. They are the least difficult plant to grow - requiring little attention. Annuals may be sown directly in the ground or started indoors for transplanting. Bedding plants raised by local greenhouse men are the surest source of vigorous plants which will assure an early and constant supply of bloom. Set them out in the flower bed or shrub border when all danger of frost is past.

Annuals are well adapted to a wide range of conditions and uses. If you are going to plant an entire bed of annuals use low kinds like verbena, alyssum and dwarf marigolds for edging; petunias, calendulas and French marigolds in the middle and for a colorful tall background use African marigolds, cleomes or giant zinnias.

9 Perennial borders lend themselves readily for a few fillers of annual plants - particularly the spreading kinds. Try a few petunias, verbenas, ageratums or browallias. For patio planters, along split rail fences and new hedges, annuals can't be beat. Keep in mind that most annuals like sun, but impatiens, coleus, clarkia and nicotiana will do well in the shade. If your soil is poor, as it often is around a new home, try some celosia euphorbia or portulaca. Remember, masses of similar colours in the same variety create a more pleasing affect than one or two plants each of several different varieties.

***** CONCERNING YELLOW FLOWERS. *****
I.P.P. Betty Langstaff has recently returned from attending the B.C. Council of Garden Clubs Conference in Burnaby. The President shares my own sentiments about our unseasonal weather, - he just expresses it in a nicer way. "It seemed for a while that Spring had caught a chill but we're hoping for a speedy recovery. There are, of course, advantages to cool weather at this time of the year. It does give our newly planted material a better chance to get established. Elsewhere in this Newsletter you'll read about the Annual Plant Sale set for Saturday, April 27. Be sure to keep reminding your friends. Our General Meeting will feature Dr. Arrand whose remarks will be most applicable to this season. Insect pests are a bit like what the Bible says about the poor, - awlays with us. Now you have an opportunity to get practical answers to your insect and mite problems. If time permits we will try to get all your questions answered. If you hesitate to ask direct questions just drop them in the Question Box. Perhaps the gardening hint for this month could be - 'if you are using a high analysis fertilizer on your lawn be sure to apply it when the grass is DRY and then wash it in with a hand nozzle. This should prevent burning except on the spots where you spilled TOO much' -.

Vernon was represented at the Spring Executive Meeting of the Okanagan Valley Horticultural Association by Betty Langstaff, Isobel Raikes, Mrs. Loebel, Margaret Zink and Morris Lincoln. Grow and Show: March 2026

Highlighted Items are featured this month for judging. All other items are given participation points only.

HOUSEPLANT DIVISION

A. 1. Any houseplant not in flower

2. Any flowering orchid
3. Any amaryllis in flower
4. Any collection of cacti/succulent plants in one container
5. "Jade Green"—any crassula ovata (jade plant)



B. CUT FLOWER SPECIMENS

6. Any flowering branch (may be forced)
7. Hellebore—one stem
8. Small spring bulbs—3 stems one variety (example: crocus, botanical tulips, winter aconite, grape hyacinth)
9. Any other spring flowering bulb—one to 3 stems

C. FLORAL ART DIVISION Note: Commercially grown leaves and flowers may be used in Division C. Accessories are also allowed.

10. Miniatures: "Soft Boiled"—an exhibit "not over 5inch" in an eggcup
11. "Joyeuse Paques"—an exhibit with an Easter Theme
12. "Spring is in the Air"—an exhibit featuring spring flowers
13. Floral Art Class: an exhibit based on the 3-5-8 principal demonstrated this month
14. Open Class—any exhibit you have created.



D. FRUITS AND VEGETABLES DIVISION

15. Starts: Show us what seedlings you have started for transplanting outside soon.

E. THE IMAGE GARDEN

16. Any photograph or collection of photographs that highlights the end of winter and the beginning of spring in your garden.

Please use a **blue ticket for participation** entries and a **white ticket for entries in the judged categories**. Place your entries in the correct category, as labelled. No more than three entries per person, per category. Thank you.

Grow and Show Entry Information

House Plants

- Houseplants and their container should be **clean**
- plants should look healthy and well cared for with bright colours of foliage.
No dead or withered leaves, flower-heads and seedpods removed, free from insect or mechanical damage and disease.
- a pot may be covered with paper or foil but only if the covering does not clash with or detract from the plant. Any tying, staking or wiring should be done neatly so it does not detract from the plant.



Cut Specimens

- Name flowers whenever possible (someone might be interested to know)
- Use a container that holds your cut flowers upright (wax paper, plastic wrap to wedge)
- When entering a grouping of flowers, try to have them similar in every way. (size, shape, stem-length and colour)
- In collections the main points that the judges are looking for are: condition, freshness, number of kinds or varieties, brilliance and clarity of colour.
- Bearded Iris: *Bi-colour* means: - the blooms have two distinctly different colours.
 - The standards or top petals being one colour
 - The falls another colour.*Bi-tone* means: - the blooms that have one colour
 - The standards are a lighter colour then the falls



Check all garden flowers for uninvited guests(ants, spiders, mites, aphids etc)

Floral Art Class

- Exhibit means: You may use fresh, dried, weathered or treated plant material.
Accessories are allowed.
- Place larger flowers lower in the arrangement so the overall design looks balanced.
- Check for proportion: Container 1/3, flowers & foliage are 2/3, 'flowers are less than 1/3 the size of container'.
- Less is more. Don't crowd the flowers. Let the beauty be seen.
- Materials used should be fresh and clean.

Where: At Linda Andrews, 1556 Phoenix Dr. Follow the path down the right side of the house.

Design: **3-5-8 floral design.** "Check out information about this design online."

Taking **3** flowers to act as the showstoppers (not necessarily the same but complimentary), **5** stems of greenery(acts as structure, mix of colours ok),and **8** stems of filler flowers (adds texture, colours and flowers are not to overpower focal flowers)

Maybe get together with someone and share material .

Once again the club is pleased to offer a basket making workshop at Meadowbrae Gardens in Salmon Arm.

The Pollinator Pathways Project

The Sustainable Environmental Network Society (SENS) promotes environmental awareness in the Okanagan.

One of SENS' current projects requires community member involvement to help local pollinators and therefore also our local food supply. The Pollinator Pathways Project encourages all community members to plant as many local pollinator-friendly flowers, vegetables, herbs and trees as possible. Pollinators are finding it increasingly difficult to survive in our current landscape. This is due to things like pesticide use, habitat destruction, climate change and development and less green space in general. Creating and protecting pesticide-free, natural, pollinator-friendly spaces can help pollinators find habitat paths through urban and rural areas, help keep our food supply vigorous and make our community look more beautiful. And helping achieve those goals does not require a tremendous amount of effort. Even planting local pollinator-friendly species in small yards, alleys, boulevards and what some call the 'forgotten strip' – the area between sidewalk

and roadway - can make a big difference!

Contact SENS through their website or their Facebook page <https://facebook.com/sensociety> for more information or to explore eligibility for displaying a Pollinator Pathway sign in your growing space. <https://www.sensociety.org/pollinator-pathways>. They have extended an invitation to our club members to attend their Seed Share and Garden Talk March 26. They will have information and signs for the Pollinator Pathway Project. If they are eligible for a sign you can display it in your garden to raise more awareness about the importance of protecting pollinators.

Nature Neighbours Day, at Allan Brooks Centre

is a one-day, outdoor, family-friendly event that brings together a wide range of local nature, environment, outdoor recreation and community organizations in one place. Visitors will be able to:

- Wander around information and activity booths from local groups
- Join short, informal talks and demonstrations about the local environment
- Take part in hands-on activities
- Explore the Centre's trail, new enlarged pond and the amazing views from our look out
- Kids can if they wish try our simple "Nature Passport" style challenge



"What to do for your Garden this month"

Prune fruit trees and woody ornamentals, then apply dormant oil and lime sulphur. Do not use lime sulphur on apricot trees.

-

Gently pull mulch back from around roses and perennials to allow the soil to warm up.

-

Cut back ornamental grasses and clear away any leaves or debris that collected over winter.

-

Begin preparing your garden beds by loosening and enriching the soil.

-

Sow early vegetable seeds such as radish, spinach, Swiss chard, lettuce, onions and peas.

-

Prune trees and shrubs that bloom before June after they have finished flowering.

-

Rake and aerate your lawn, then apply a quality spring fertiliser.

-

Avoid pruning birch, maple or walnut trees now. These are best pruned in late summer.

-

Remove weak, diseased or damaged raspberry canes before new growth starts. Cut out last year's fruiting canes and shorten the remaining healthy canes.

-

Stay ahead of weeds as temperatures rise. Weed early before they have a chance to grow large and set seed.
